AGENDA ITEM: Consent Calendar

Recommendation:

Approve all proposed actions on the October 17, 2012 Consent Calendar by single motion and Council action.

Discussion:

In general, the Consent Calendar contains routine matters or matters that have already been discussed by the City Council. It is adopted in total with a single motion and Council action. However, if any councilmember or member of the public has questions or wishes to discuss an item further, it may be removed from the Consent Calendar and placed later on the agenda for discussion and action. The way to remove an item from the Consent Calendar is to request its removal, by agenda item number, immediately prior to the adoption of the Consent Calendar. Members of the public may fill out a request to speak on the item they wish removed and the City Clerk will note the item for removal. No reason need be given with the request. Items pulled from the Consent Calendar are not discussed at the time they are pulled; they are scheduled for discussion immediately after action on the balance of the Consent Calendar.

The October 17th Consent Calendar contains the following eight items:

6.1 Approval of the minutes from the September 19, 2012 regular City Council meeting, as submitted.

- 6.2 Approval of a motion to allow reading proposed ordinances and resolutions by title only this is a standard practice in cities. If this motion is not approved, all ordinances and resolutions must be read out loud in their entirety during the Council Meeting.
- 6.3 Approval of a motion to receive and file the September Treasurer's Report. This report identifies the City's current liquid assets and their location. At the end of September, the City had approximately \$7.8 million in cash on hand and in other liquid assets.
- 6.4 Approval of the October 17, 2012 Warrant Register, as submitted, in the amount of \$471,528.51. A list of all warrants is included in the agenda packet; detailed information about individual warrants is available in the Finance Manager's office.
- 6.5 Approval of a resolution clarifying that employee contributions to the CalPERS retirement system are pre-tax. At its September 19, 2012 meeting, the City Council took action to shift the payment of 7% of the City's contribution to the CalPERS retirement system to employees. This resolution assures that these contributions will be considered pre-tax by the Internal Revenue Service, as are the balance of employer contributions. If contributions were to be made on a different basis, there would need to be an annual calculation identifying the tax-exempt portion of individual pension payments. This resolution will establish the entire amount contributed from Laguna Woods city and employees as tax exempt and, therefore, taxable upon distribution.
- 6.6 Authorization for the City Manager to execute an agreement with Michael Brandman Associates for the provision of environmental services associated with the Village Activity Center specific plan. The proposed agreement amount is \$114,220, plus the ability for the City Manager to increase the agreement cost up to 20% for required services. The City issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for environmental review services of the specific plan on August 3, 2012. Five proposals were received by the August 31st due date. The RFP required consultants to submit a proposed scope of services and a separate cost proposal in a sealed envelope. City staff and our consultant (Hogle-Ireland) reviewed the proposals and selected two firms as the most responsive. Cost proposals were opened after this selection, but prior to interviews.

Cost proposals ranged from \$59,901 to \$197,793. The two firms interviewed revised their cost proposals after discussion about the specifics of the project as follows:

City staff believes that either firm is capable of providing the services required. The applicant (GRF) has requested that the City select MBA because: 1) MBA is a local Orange County firm with an understanding of Orange County issues - Rincon is in Ventura County and has not worked on projects in South Orange County and 2) MBA has offices in Irvine and an excellent reputation for community interaction – Rincon, located in Ventura, anticipated that much of their interaction with the applicant and city staff would be by telephone. The entire cost of the selected consultant's environmental work will be funded by the applicant.

Authorization for the City Manager to execute agreements with WM Curbside, Inc. and Ware Disposal, Inc. for the provision of household hazardous waste, medical waste, electronic waste, sharps and in-home bulky item collection services through June 30, 2015, with two one-year optional extensions. The City's door-to-door Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) collection program was initiated in April 2002 and has expanded in subsequent years to include Sharps, electronic waste (E-Waste), medications, batteries, fluorescent lights and in-home bulky items. The City released a Request for Proposals (RFP) for these services on August 10, 2012; three proposals were received by the September 7th deadline. The RFP called for as-needed collection services of HHW, medical waste, E-Waste, Sharps and in-home bulky items, and allowed the City to split the contracts among responsive bidders. The current agreement for all services is with WM Curbside and will expire on October 31, 2012.

Clean Harbors Environmental Services, Inc. was the highest priced vendor and did not propose on collection of medications at City Hall or in-home bulky items. WM Curbside, Inc. was the lowest priced vendor for collection of door-to-door HHW and E-Waste, and medical and other HHW waste dropped off at City Hall. Ware Disposal was the lowest priced vendor for collection of Sharps, E-Waste dropped off at City Hall and in-home bulky

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items. Staff believes that the City will be best served by contracting with WM Curbside, Inc. and Ware Disposal, Inc. for the services noted. Adequate funds for continuation of all services are included in the current fiscal year budget.

6.8 Approval of a resolution establishing fees for the sale of certain City promotional products. From time to time the City has sold promotional products, such as t-shirts and coffee mugs to interested individuals at the actual cost. Currently, staff proposes to sell honey for the City Hall's rooftop hives. The honey is packaged in 8 oz. jars and an equivalent market price for raw honey is \$9 – \$12. Staff is proposing a price of \$10 per jar for City Hall honey. The City incurs ongoing costs maintaining the hives, which is estimated to be approximately \$5,000 in the current fiscal year. The maintenance contract includes a percentage of honey returned to the City. Although the honey is provided at no cost, there is a cost for the jars. It is expected that the City will receive approximately 20 – 30 jars of honey per year.

The above matters are routine and/or have been reviewed by the Council on other occasions. Staff recommends that they be approved as part of the October 17, 2012 Consent Calendar.

VII. PUBLIC HEARING

7.1 Cell Tower Modification (CUP-745)

City Manager Keane summarized the agenda report and noted that the project was submitted prior to new regulations implemented by Congress in early 2012. She explained that cities are no longer able to go through a discretionary review process for minor modifications to existing wireless towers; however, the applicant chose to proceed with the process.

The public hearing was opened. There being no requests to speak, the public hearing was closed.

Moved by Councilmember Hack, seconded by Councilmember Rhodes, and carried unanimously to approve **Resolution No. 12-16**, entitled:

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF

LAGUNA WOODS, CALIFORNIA APPROVING CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT CUP 745 FOR THE EXPANSION OF AN EXISTING "MINOR" WIRELESS FACILITY LOCATED ON THE ROSSMOOR TOWERS BUILDINGS AT 24055 PASEO DEL LAGO

7.2 Initial Study/Negative Declaration ND 12-02 – Aliso Creek Pedestrian Bridge and Service Road Reconstruction

City Planner Kurnow summarized the agenda report and noted that the proposed pedestrian bridge and service road are designed to stabilize the creek bed and provide safe access across and to Aliso Creek for pedestrians and service vehicles.

Councilmember Hack asked for clarification to the definition of Negative Declaration.

City Manager Keane explained that a Negative Declaration simply means that there is no negative impact on the environment.

The public hearing was opened.

Barbara Copely, resident and United Mutual Director, stated that it has been two years since the Golden Rain Foundation (GRF) first introduced the project. She stated that the City has delayed the project and asked Council to take immediate action.

City Manager Keane noted that the applicant believed that no environmental review was required for this project, but that the City was unable to make that finding and processed the project in accordance with city regulations and state law. She also noted that the City is only one part of the process and asked City Planner Kurnow to explain the roles of other environmental agencies.

City Planner Kurnow explained that the City filed an exemption request with the California Department of Fish and Game which denied the request, based on the scope of work which affects the stream bed.

City Manager Keane asked if there are pending approvals from other agencies.

City Planner Kurnow acknowledged that notices were sent to the Army Corps of Engineer and the Regulatory Water Quality Board. GRF must go through those agencies' permit process and meet their requirements.

City Manager Keane asked if the City has completed the building permit process.

City Planner Kurnow stated that there are several outstanding issues that must be resolved before the City can issue permits and the City is waiting from a response from the applicant to City comments on the plans.

Approval of the resolution was moved by Councilmember Hack, who noted that the City is waiting for further submission from GRF and that this is the first discussion presented to Council and that they can only proceed as fast as the process allows.

A resident asked if a draft of the bridge plans is available.

City Manager Keane stated that staff could make plans available for review by residents.

Mayor Conners discussed the statutory steps required by the City in regards to the environmental review process. She reiterated that the City has been responsive to the project.

A representative of GRF (the applicant) announced that they have received approval from the Department of Fish and Game and that they are only waiting on the outcome of the City's environmental process.

Councilmember Hack reiterated the roles of various agencies and noted that the City must conform to California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) regulations.

A resident thanked the Council and staff for clarification of the project.

A resident noted that the existing service road is very rough and uneven.

City Manager Keane clarified that the proposed project includes reconstruction of the service road.

A resident asked if handrails are included in the project.

City Planner Kurnow stated that GRF and the City are still discussing this issue as part of the building permit process. The City believes the handrails are required, but GRF has asked for an exemption.

The resident asked if the bridge would be wide enough for wheelchair access and would there be something on the sides that would prevent someone from falling.

City Manager Keane reiterated that the City is waiting for GRF to provide documentation regarding deleting the handrails – at this point the City believes they are required.

A resident asked if the earliest and latest completion dates are available.

City Manager Keane stated that the City cannot make that determination and that GRF has its own processes. However, she noted that the environmental report will be completed once Council approves the resolution.

City Planner Kurnow confirmed that the City's building official indicated that the railing issue is being discussed. He further explained that there is a 30-day challenge period after adoption of the Negative Declaration.

City Manager Keane stated that it is up to the applicant if they wish to proceed with the project during the 30-day period.

A resident asked if it would take one month before approval of the building permit.

City Manager Keane stated that, from the City's perspective, it would take less time if the issue of the handrails can be resolved.

A resident asked why the process is taking so long to an already existing bridge that is undergoing repair.

City Manager Keane explained that the replacement bridge is not in the same location as the original bridge and, therefore, environmental review is required.

A resident asked why there is so much discussion about whether or not a railing should be included in the project; he hopes that common sense prevails and they are included.

City Manager Keane suggested that residents would have to discuss this matter with GRF.

There being no further requests to speak, the public hearing was closed.

Moved by Councilmember Hack, seconded by Councilmember Rhodes, and carried unanimously to approve **Resolution No. 12-17**, issuing Negative Declaration ND 12-02, entitled:

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LAGUNA WOODS, CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING NEGATIVE DECLARATION 12-02 FOR THE RECONSTRUCTION OF THE ALISO CREEK PEDESTRIAN BRIDGE AND SERVICE ROAD

7.3 Community Development Block Grants

City Manager Keane summarized the agenda report beginning with the Rehabilitation Projects category. She noted that the City will solicit applications in October for the FY 2012-13 for the energy efficiency improvement program. Staff proposes that the City apply for continuation of this program in FY 2013-14.

Councilmember Hack asked about the status of the current eligibility list and how staff determines that the current list does not include residents who have received grants in prior years.

City Manager Keane stated that applications are checked against prior grantees.

Community Services Manager Foley confirmed that there are only a few names remaining of the existing list and they would be at the top of the new list.

City Manager Keane summarized the agenda report pertaining to Public Facilities and Improvement Projects. She explained that the existing City Hall electrical panel is insufficient for the new generator approved by the Council. She noted that City Hall is a designated "cooling center" and the generator is required to provide air conditioning if

there is an electricity failure. Staff proposes that the City apply for funds to enlarge the electric panel.

Councilmember Hack asked if the new electrical panel would provide sufficient electrical capacity if City Hall were to operate during a power outage.

Public Safety Director Macon affirmed that the electrical capacity would be equivalent and that only physical space is needed for a new larger panel.

City Manager Keane discussed the second priority proposed project which is lighting for City Centre Park. When the park was constructed, it was wired for lighting, but there was insufficient funding to purchase lighting fixtures. The proposed project would provide funding for safety lighting along the walkway and lighting at the activity center at the top of the facility.

Councilmember Hack asked if staff is proposing to modify the hours of operation of City Centre Park.

City Manager Keane clarified that the lighting at the upper level would require a key to turn on and off; and bollard lighting is proposed along the pathway.

Assistant City Manager Reilly clarified that current park hours are from dawn until dusk and the proposed lighting in the activity area would be turned on only for special events.

City Manager Keane explained that the intent of the public hearing is to discuss and prioritize the projects proposed as well as invite comments and suggestions from the public.

The public hearing was opened.

David Russell Ohrn, resident and member of the Village Amateur Radio Club, stated that he supports the proposal to add a generator to City Hall that can support a cooling center and the emergency communication center in the event of a disaster.

Barbara Copley, resident, stated that the cost to fund for lighting at City Centre Park seems excessive and asked Council to take careful consideration before acting on such expenditures. She believes that there are already sufficient facilities in the City to hold special events.

Mayor Conners indicated that the competitive grants are available to other cities in the county and that it is up to the Council to choose whether Laguna Woods should benefit from the funding.

Bevann Strom, a resident, commended the City for its efforts to serve the community as a whole and not just focus to the gated community. She noted that facilities such as City Centre Park improve the quality of life and the value of homes. She stated her support for the lighting project at City Centre Park.

Shari Horne, resident, stated that both projects will be assets to the community and she supports both. She suggested the City consider solar lighting for the park pathway.

There being no further requests to speak, the public hearing was closed.

Councilmember Rhodes stated that City Centre Park might be utilized more often with proper lighting, and he likes the idea of using solar lighting and is supportive of the project.

Councilmember Hack discussed the initial plans of City Centre Park and that further improvements could benefit residents of the City at large.

City Manager Keane noted that staff is looking into the City of Irvine's use of bollard solar pathway lighting to see if it is something the City could consider using. She announced that electrical wiring was already installed during the initial construction and can be used, should solar lighting prove ineffective.

Moved by Councilmember Robbins, seconded by Councilmember Rhodes, and carried unanimously to prioritize project proposals and authorized staff to submit applications to the County of Orange for funding consideration under the federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program:

1. Rehabilitation Projects:

First Priority: Low Income Residential Energy Efficiency Improvements Project (\$150,000)

2. Public Facilities and Improvements Projects:

First Priority: Phase VI Emergency Power and Appurtenances – Laguna Woods designated Severe Weather Shelter (\$250,000)

Second Priority: City Centre Park Safety Lighting (\$200,000)

VIII. CITY COUNCIL - None

IX. CITY MANAGER - None

X. COMMITTEE REPORTS

10.1 Transportation Corridor Agencies (Mayor Hack)

Councilmember Hack reported that the Agency may be one year away from automating its toll collection process. He discussed the retirement of the Agency's CEO and the need to recruit to fill the position.

10.2 Orange County Library Board (Councilmember Robbins)

Councilmember Robbins reported that there was no meeting and that the next meeting is scheduled for October 18, 2012.

10.3 Orange County Fire Authority (Councilmember Rhodes)

Councilmember Rhodes reported that there was no meeting and that the next scheduled meeting will be held in November. He reiterated Chief Bryce's invitation to visit OCFA headquarters' open house on October 13th and discussed the many services which the Authority and firefighters provide. He urged residents to express their gratitude by visiting Station 22.

Mayor Conners concurred that the Authority provides various regional rescue services and training programs relevant to the community.

10.4 Southern California Water Committee (Mayor Hack)

Councilmember Hack reported that the annual dinner will take place in October and he will be unable to attend. He announced that the Committee is involved in a number of projects, including the topic of waste water.

10.5 Coastal Greenbelt Authority (Mayor Pro Tem Connors)

Mayor Conners reported that there was no meeting and that the next scheduled meeting will be held tomorrow at 5 p.m. at City Hall.

10.6 Laguna Canyon Foundation (Councilmember Rhodes)

Councilmember Rhodes reported that the Board met on September 6, 2012 and approved the Fiscal Year 2012-13 Budget. The Foundation is in the process of acquiring the last 14 acres of property for the Laguna Coast Wilderness Park; fundraising efforts are going well; and the clearing of Arundo plants is underway. He noted that negotiations continue regarding the planned wildlife corridor and he reported on a recent event highlighting butterflies. The next scheduled meeting will be held on November 1, 2012.

10.7 Vector Control District Board (Councilmember Robbins)

Councilmember Robbins noted that the Board's monthly report included 80 dead birds, 64 were tested for the West Nile Virus (WNV); 35 tested positive. However, none were from Laguna Woods or its neighboring cities of Lake Forest and Laguna Hills. Two more cases of the WNV one each in Anaheim and Cypress were reported, for a total of three in Orange County. He urged residents to empty any standing water which might attract mosquitoes. The next scheduled meeting will be held tomorrow, September 20th.

XI. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Barbara Copley, resident, expressed her concerns that a number of bird baths exist in the community that may be a breeding ground for the West Nile Virus. She asked if the City could work in collaboration with the Village to regulate the issue.

City Manager Keane stated that the City could look into the issue. She also noted that Vector Control is concerned with flea-borne typhus as well.

Councilmember Hack indicated that battery-operated bird baths, which control and move water so it does not stagnate, are available.

XII. CITY COUNCIL COMMENTS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

12.1 Reports on Meetings Attended per Government Code §53232.3

A. League of California Cities/Orange County Division Quarterly Meeting, August 23, 2012 – Mayor Pro Tem Ring, Councilmember Hack

Mayor Pro Tem Ring reported that the main objective was to elect officers and the following is a list of top three seats: President – Keith Curry, Mayor Pro Tem City of Newport Beach; First Vice-President – Scott Nelson, Mayor Pro Tem City of Placentia; Second Vice-President – Bert Murdock, Mayor Pro Tem City of Brea. Michael Coleman was the guest speaker and he spoke on California's fiscal outlook.

Councilmember Hack felt that the speaker provided complex and insightful information and a thorough discussion of the history of government finance in California.

B. Water Advisory Committee Orange County (WACO), September 7, 2012 – Councilmember Hack

Councilmember Hack reported that the Army Corps of Engineers discussed a number of projects, including refurbishing and maintaining the Santa Ana Watershed. He discussed the problems associated with storing water at the site and asked the Corps if they had considered dredging as a solution. He was informed that they would discuss the topic at the next meeting.

12.2 Other Meetings, Comments and Announcements

Councilmember Rhodes commented on the American Legion's Freedom Walk from City Hall to Clubhouse 1 in commemoration of the tragic events of 9-1-1. He reported that speeches by Mayor Conners, OCFA Chief Bryce and OCSD Lieutenant Rudy were well received; however, the attendance was a disappointing low. He reminded residents to take notice of the event and not take freedom for granted. Councilmember Rhodes announced that the City's Laguna Woods Good Exchange took place on September 15th and again proved to be a success.

Councilmember Hack thanked staff who worked tirelessly on the event.

Councilmember Rhodes stated that he was impressed at how well organized this event was and that the large space to accommodate the event was a plus.

Councilmember Hack commented on the progress of the City Hall/Library Site project and expressed grave concern about safety to residents as they access the facilities.

City Manager Keane noted that staff is in the process of having the sidewalk area completed as quickly as possible and is looking at alternatives for safer access in the interim.

Mayor Conners reported on a meeting she attended of the OC Waste Management Commission. She announced an upcoming ribbon-cutting ceremony at the Alpha-Olinda site that recycles waste energy and captures methane gas which is purified and sold to OCTA to operate its buses. She also noted that the City Council has three open seats for the November 6th election with six candidates running. The League of Women Voters will host a candidate forum at City Hall on Monday, September 24th at 4 p.m. which will be broadcast and replayed at later dates.

XIII. CLOSED SESSION

13.1 The City Council met in closed session to confer with legal counsel regarding two matters of potential litigation, pursuant to the provisions of Government Code Section 54956.9(c).

The City Council reconvened in open session at 4:00 p.m. City Attorney Cosgrove advised that there was no reportable action.

XIV. ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned at 4:00 p.m. The next regular meeting will be at 2:00 p.m. on Wednesday October 17, 2012 at Laguna Woods City Hall, 24264 El Toro Road, Laguna Woods, CA 92637.

"Employee contributions" shall mean those contributions to CalPERS which are deducted from the salary of employees and are credited to individual employee accounts pursuant to California Government Code section 20691.
- 2. The contributions made by the City of Laguna Woods to CalPERS, although designated as employee contributions, are being paid by the City of Laguna Woods in lieu of contributions by the employees who are members of CalPERS.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LAGUNA WOODS, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING SECTION 13.26.025 OF THE LAGUNA WOODS MUNICIPAL CODE AND MAKING MODIFICATIONS TO REGULATIONS GOVERNING MEDICAL MARIJUANA DISPENSARIES

Background

In 2008, the City Council adopted regulations (Municipal Code Section 13.26.025) governing medical marijuana dispensaries in the City. At its May 16, 2012 meeting, the Council approved introduction and first reading of an ordinance that would modify some of the existing operating condition requirements for dispensaries.

Discussion

The Laguna Woods' Municipal Code contains a permitting process, which allows medical marijuana dispensaries in certain zoning districts (community commercial and professional office) under specified operating conditions. Permit applications must include a written acknowledgement from the property owner that the facility will engage in medical marijuana dispensing.

Operating conditions for medical marijuana dispensaries include hours of operation, records maintenance and verification, storage of products and dispensing requirements, a separate ventilation system in multi-unit building (to avoid inconvenience to other tenants) and the inability to obstruct windows or doors (this is a general requirement for all buildings in community commercial and professional office zones). In addition, medical marijuana dispensaries must surrender security tapes on demand and can only dispense product to Laguna Woods' residents.

To date, the City has received hundreds of inquiries, but no actual permit applications. Potential applicants have informed staff that Laguna Woods' property owners are unwilling to lease space for this purpose. Although staff expected to have concerns raised about the requirement that distribution be limited to Laguna Woods' residents, no potential applicant has raised this as a significant issue.

In an effort to simplify the application review and monitoring impact on the City and the Orange County Sheriff's Department, staff is recommending that the requirements for the surrender of security tapes and limit on patient distribution be eliminated. These last two requirements are unique to medical marijuana dispensaries and would be time-consuming and costly to enforce with only limited benefit to the oversight of the permits.

Fiscal Impact

Since the City currently has no medical marijuana dispensaries, there is no quantifiable information available regarding the costs to monitor medical marijuna dispensaries. Elimination of the recommended requirements is expected to reduce City costs should a dispensary open.

Conclusion

Approval of the proposed modifications to current medical marijuana dispensary permit regulations will simplify the staff and Orange County Sheriff's Department

review and monitoring of permits; and is not expected to have any effect on the number of dispensaries that might apply for or receive a permit. If, at the conclusion of the public hearing, the City Council adopts the proposed amendments, they would become effective in mid-November 2012.

WHEREAS, in 2008, the City of Laguna Woods adopted regulations permitting the location and operation of medical marijuana dispensaries in community commercial zoning districts, subject to certain specified conditions; and

WHEREAS, the City finds it now appropriate to modify existing regulations.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LAGUNA WOODS, CALIFORNIA, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The City Council finds that the actions contemplated by this ordinance are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15061 (b) 3 and 15305 of the Guidelines, in that the amendment does not have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment.

SECTION 2. Sections 13.26.025 (k) (4) and 13.26.025 (l) (1) of the Laguna Woods Municipal Code are herby deleted.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force thirty (30) days from and after the date of its final passage and adoption, or until otherwise superseded by action of the City Council or by operation of State Law.

Recommendation

Approve first reading of an ordinance modifying regulations for patio enclosures, entitled:

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LAGUNA WOODS, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 10.08, OF THE LAGUNA WOODS MUNICIPAL CODE PERTAINING TO WINDOW REQUIREMENTS IN PATIO ENCLOSURES

Background

Every three years the California Building Standards Commission (BSC) updates the California Codes governing construction practices in the State of California. Affected state agencies review these codes, and the BSC adopts them in the California Administrative Code, Title 24. After the state Code is published, every city and county throughout the state has an opportunity to adopt the Codes with more stringent local amendments based on local geological, topographical and/or climatic conditions. The Codes contain both mandatory elements and appendices which are optional.

In November 2010, the City adopted the most recent Building Codes, with appropriate modifications related to the unique circumstances of the county and city. These codes included prohibition against the installation of dual pane windows in patio enclosures. This prohibition, contained in Appendix I, Section I101.1, was based on concerns about energy savings and stability of the enclosure structures.

Discussion

Many residents have installed dual pane windows in their homes — including patio enclosures - to improve energy efficiency. The City Building Official has reviewed standard plans for building enclosures and believes that the stability/load concern is no longer valid and that dual windows can be accommodated safely in patio enclosures. Although dual pane windows installed in patio enclosures may not provide the energy efficiency expected by property owners due to the construction type and lack of installation, they do provide some energy savings and contribute to the overall aesthetic consistency of structures in which other dual pane windows have been installed.

Since appendices to the state Building Code need not be adopted by local agencies, no findings of a unique local condition are required for their deletion and no notification to the state Building Standards Commission of the modification is required.

Fiscal Impact

There is no anticipated negative financial impact associated with the proposed regulation. In fact, it may reduce the number of uncompensated complaint and compliance inspections.

Conclusion

If first reading of the ordinance is approved by the Council, a public hearing and second reading would be scheduled for the November Council meeting. The new regulations would become effective 30 days following the second reading. The regulations would apply to both new patio enclosures and existing patios that have completed city permits.

ORDINANCE NO. 12-XX

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LAGUNA WOODS, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 10.08, OF THE LAGUNA WOODS MUNICIPAL CODE PERTAINING TO WINDOW REQUIRMENTS IN PATIO ECLOSURES

WHEREAS, Health and Safety Code Section 17922 requires that, except as otherwise specifically provided by law, local agencies must adopt by reference the regulations contained in Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations, as adopted, amended, or repealed from time; and

WHEREAS, regulations found within appendices of Title 24 are not mandated by the state; and

WHEREAS, the Laguna Woods Building Official has recommended that the City consider a modification to building regulations associated with patio enclosures that would allow the installation of dual pane windows.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LAGUNA WOODS, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY ORDANE AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Modification to Existing Code Section

Chapter 10.08.240 of the City of Laguna Woods Municipal Code (California Building Code, Appendix I, Section I101.1 amended) is hereby modified to read in its entity as follows:

I101.1 General. Patio covers shall be permitted to be detached from or attached to *dwelling units*. Patio Covers shall be used only for recreational, outdoor living purposes and not as carports, garages, storage rooms or habitable rooms. Openings shall be permitted to be enclosed with insect screening, approved translucent or transparent plastic not more than 0.125 inch (3.2 mm) in thickness, glazing conforming to the provisions of Chapter 24, or any combination of the foregoing. Multiple glazing may be allowed when meeting the requirements of all other sections of this code.

SECTION 2. Effective Date

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and operation thirty (30) days after the second reading of the adopted ordinance.

SECTION 3. Severability

If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase added by this Ordinance, or any part thereof, is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid or ineffective by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of effectiveness of the remaining portions of this Ordinance or any part thereof. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more subsections. subdivisions, paragraphs sentences, clauses, phrases or are declared unconstitutional, invalid, or ineffective.

SECTION 4. City Clerk's Certification.

The City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this Ordinance and shall cause this Ordinance to be published or posted as required by law.

Recommendation

Approve first reading of an ordinance clarifying the enforcement of temporary sign regulations, entitled:

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LAGUNA WOODS, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 13.20 OF THE LAGUNA WOODS MUNICIPAL CODE PERTAINING TO TEMPORARY SIGN REGULATIONS

Background

Municipal Code Chapter 13.20 Section contains regulations for temporary signs. These regulations anticipate that: 1) illegal signs on public property can be removed and fines issued immediately and 2) fines can be levied immediately for illegal signs on private property, but the signs themselves must be removed by the sign or property owner. Staff has established an enforcement policy which allows for warnings prior to the issuance of fines for signs on both public and private property.

Discussion

The City's temporary sign regulations are found in its zoning code. Generally, state law establishes that code enforcement of zoning code violations requires a five day "notice to correct" period prior to issuance of a citation and subsequent fines. With respect to temporary signs, strict interpretation of this requirement could allow sign proponents to put up illegal signs repeatedly for five day periods, and the City would have no ability to remove — or have removed — illegal signs or to issue citations. Although the City Attorney's Office believes that temporary signs are not subject to

the five day requirement, they have suggested the addition of language that would clarify the City's right to require immediately removal of temporary signs.

Fiscal Impact

There is no anticipated negative financial impact associated with the proposed regulation.

Conclusion

If first reading of the ordinance is approved by the Council, a public hearing and second reading would be scheduled for the November Council meeting. The new regulations would become effective 30 days following the second reading.

ORDINANCE NO. 12-XX

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LAGUNA WOODS, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 13.20 OF THE LAGUNA WOODS MUNICIPAL CODE PERTAINING TO TEMPORARY SIGN REGULATIONS

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Laguna Woods wishes to protect and preserve the quality of the residential and commercial areas of the City, as well as the quality of life throughout the City, through effective land use and planning; and

WHEREAS, on March 16, 2011, the City Council adopted Ordinance 11-04 which enacted a new Chapter 13.20 to the Laguna Woods Municipal Code relating to signs; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to amend Chapter 13.20 of the Laguna Woods Municipal Code by adding specific language that will clarify standards; and

WHEREAS, Section 1.02.060 of the Laguna Woods Municipal Code prescribes a method of repealing, amending, and adding portions of the Laguna Woods Municipal Code, which shall be made by Ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LAGUNA WOODS, CALIFORNIA DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1.</u> Section 13.20.160 of Chapter 13.20 of the Laguna Woods Municipal Code is hereby repealed as follows:

Sec. 13.20.160. - Enforcement.

- (a) Consecutive violations. Each day in which a violation occurs and each separate sign in violation of this chapter shall constitute a separate violation of this chapter punishable by fines or sentences issued in accordance herewith.
- (b) *Illegal signs*. Any sign that does not have a required permit or otherwise violates this chapter shall be deemed illegal. If the City Manager determines a sign to be illegal, he/she may order the property owner and/or sign owner to remove the sign or may require such other actions to ensure compliance with this chapter.

- (c) Signs on City property. The City Manager may remove any illegal signs on City property summarily and without prior notice. Illegal signs may be disposed if they are not claimed within five working days of removal.
- (d) Signs on private property. The City Manager may order the property owner and/or sign owner to remove any illegal signs on private property or may require such other actions to ensure compliance with this chapter. Upon failure to comply with a removal order from the City Manager, the City Manager may exercise the nuisance abatement process described in this Code to remove illegal signs. Illegal signs may be disposed if they are not claimed within ten working days of removal.
- (e) Fees. The City Council may establish by resolution fees as are necessary and reasonable to cover the cost of removing and storing illegal signs. Such fees shall be collected at the time of claim. The City Manager is authorized to use collection proceedings to recover uncollected fees after the claim period has ended.
- (f) Liability. Neither the City nor any of its agents shall be liable for any damage to a sign which is removed under this section.
- (g) Non-exclusive remedies. Each and every remedy available for the enforcement of this chapter shall be non-exclusive and it is within the discretion of the City Manager to seek cumulative remedies. The remedies available to the City pursuant to this Code and chapter, including but not limited to removal authority, shall not limit the right of the City to seek any other remedy that may be available by law.

(Ord. No. 11-04, § 4, 3-16-2011)

SECTION 2. A replacement Section 13.20.160 of Chapter 13.20 of the Laguna Woods Municipal Code is hereby added to read as follows:

Sec. 13.20.160. - Enforcement.

- (a) *Illegal signs*. Any sign that does not have a required permit, or otherwise violates this chapter, shall be deemed illegal.
- (b) Administrative Fines. If the City Manager determines a sign is illegal, he/she may impose an administrative fine against the property owner, the sign owner, or both in accordance with chapters 1.04 and 1.06 of this Code. Consistent with section 1.04.010(i)(5) of this Code, any violation of this chapter may be deemed to be an infraction and may be punished as such, notwithstanding the fact that, at the discretion of the District Attorney, any violation of this chapter may be filed as a

misdemeanor. The complaint charging such violation shall specify whether the violation is a misdemeanor or an infraction. Notwithstanding section 1.06.040(b) of this Code and section 53069.4(2)(a) of the California Government Code, the City Manager may impose an administrative fine against the owner of an illegal temporary sign, the owner of the property where an illegal temporary sign is displayed, or both without providing said owner(s) with prior notice of violation and/or a correction period.

(c) Abatement.

- (1) Signs on private property. The City Manager may order a property owner and/or sign owner to remove any illegal signs on private property. Upon failure to comply with a removal order from the City Manager, the City Manager may exercise the nuisance abatement process described in Title 1, sections 1.08.030 through 1.08.140 of this Code to remove illegal signs. Abated signs shall be retained at City Hall for a period of not less than ten (10) working days, after which the signs shall be considered abandoned, and may be discarded by the City.
- (2) Signs on City property. To advance the City's interests in improving traffic safety and/or the appearance of the City, the City Manager may remove any illegal signs located within the public right-of-way or on public property immediately, without prior notice to the sign owner. Abated signs shall be retained at City Hall for a period of not less than ten (10) working days, after which the signs shall be considered abandoned, and may be discarded.
- (d) Enforcement Fees. Should the City be required to remove any illegal or abandoned signs, the reasonable cost of such removal shall be assessed against the owner of such signs. The cost of removal shall be established by a Resolution of the City Council. The City Manager is authorized to use collection proceedings to recover uncollected fees.
- (e) Consecutive Violations. Each separate sign in violation of this chapter and each day in which a violation occurs and shall constitute a separate violation of this chapter punishable by separate enforcement fees and/or administrative fines.
- (f) Liability. Neither the City nor any of its agents shall be liable for any damage to a sign which is removed under this section.
- (g) *Non-exclusive remedies*. Each and every remedy available for the enforcement of this chapter shall be non-exclusive and it is within the discretion of the City Manager to seek cumulative remedies. The remedies available to the City pursuant

to this Code and chapter, including but not limited to removal authority, shall not limit the right of the City to seek any other remedy that may be available by law.

SECTION 3. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and operation thirty (30) days after adoption.

SECTION 4. Severability

If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase added by this Ordinance, or any part thereof, is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid or ineffective by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of effectiveness of the remaining portions of this Ordinance or any part thereof. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more subsections, subdivisions. paragraphs sentences, clauses. phrases declared or are unconstitutional, invalid, or ineffective.

Recommendation:

Approve an exception to the current street excavation moratorium on Santa Maria Avenue, and authorize the City Manager to issue an encroachment permit that will allow El Toro Water District to initiate work on a recycled water project.

Background

El Toro Water District (ETWD) is currently in the final engineering design phase of a recycled water project that will provide recycled water for landscape irrigation within the cities of Laguna Woods and Laguna Hills. The project includes new facilities at ETWD's existing water recycling plant located near Moulton Parkway and Ridge Route Drive, and installation of new pipelines in public rights-of-way and on private property. A portion of this project will be funded with grants that require project completion by June 2014.

Discussion

The distribution system for the ETWD recycled water project consists of approximately 19 miles of pipeline installed within existing street rights-of-way and on private property in residential neighborhoods, primarily in Laguna Woods Village and Laguna Hills. The project is divided into two main areas. The area east of Moulton Parkway runs from the Laguna Woods Village Golf Course almost to the I-5 freeway. The area west of Moulton Parkway extends from Lake Forest Drive south to El Toro Road, but does

not yet include the Village Gates 9 and 11 areas. Construction of the distribution system is expected to start later this year. Construction of the new tertiary treatment plant, which will be required to treat water before distribution, is scheduled to start early next year.

To complete design engineering for the distribution system and subsequent installation of pipelines for recycled water, ETWD has requested an encroachment permit to pothole and then trench a section of Santa Maria Avenue, from Santa Vittoria Drive to Avenida Sosiega. The City's municipal code prohibits excavation in newly renovated streets for three years. Santa Maria Avenue was renovated in 2011, and a notice of completion was filed in November 2011. Section 9.04.080 (3) of the Code, provides five exceptions to this moratorium, including emergencies that endanger life or property, interruption of essential utility services, work that is mandated by City, state or federal legislation, service for buildings where no other reasonable means of providing service exists, and other situations deemed by the City Council to be in the best interest of the general public.

ETWD and City staff believe that this project will provide a variety of benefits to its customers by reducing dependence on imported water supplies, enhancing conservation of drinking water resources, and improving potable water delivery reliability in the face of potential emergency and drought conditions. In addition, City staff has met with ETWD staff to identify connections from the new recycled water system to the City's existing landscape meters. Connection points have been identified to serve El Toro Road, Santa Maria Avenue, Ridge Route Drive (Linear Park) and Moulton Parkway north of El Toro Road.

City Council approval of an exception to the moratorium on excavation on Santa Maria will allow the ETWD project to move forward. If the City Council does not approve the encroachment permit, there is no currently feasible means of serving landscaped areas in Laguna Woods Village south of Santa Maria Avenue or in City rights-of-way on El Toro Road west of Moulton Parkway.

Fiscal Impact

ETWD will reimburse the City for all expenses related to the encroachment permit and will have its contractor repair any damaged sections of the roadway and repave the entire area.

Conclusion

ETWD has requested an encroachment permit to allow for testing and trenching of a portion of Santa Maria Avenue, from Santa Vittoria Drive to Avenida Sosiega. It is their intention to construct a recycled water distribution system for landscape irrigation that would serve residents in Laguna Woods Village and Laguna Hills. Recycled water would also be available for landscape irrigation in City parks and rights-of-way. The Laguna Woods Municipal Code prohibits excavation in newly renovated streets for three years; Santa Maria Avenue was renovated in 2011. The City Council can make an exception to the exemption by finding that the project is in the best interest of the general public.
